
Akamonkai Japanese Language School was established in July 1985 in front of the Akamon gate of the University of Tokyo. At present, the school has 2 school buildings and 4 student dormitories located in Tokyo's Nippori area. We are a traditional Japanese language school where over 1,000 students from 25 countries study regularly. Akamonkai offers a {school entrance course}, {business employment course} and {short term/internship program}. A specialist instructor is assigned to each course, and the content of each course is adjusted as necessary to most efficiently and effectively achieve the goals of each course, without excessive focus on and adherence to existing curriculums. In addition, in recent years Akamonkai has designed its curriculum and operated its courses to suit the needs of international students, providing all around support from entrance to the school through to graduation, earning a reputation as a Japanese language school that excels at total balance. At Akamonkai our outstanding staff provide the fullest support possible to allow all enrolled students to achieve their goals with an aim to fostering human resources who can act and be successful globally.

Detailed skill level based class compositions suited to study levels. Learn at the optimal level.



Beginner classes for learning daily conversational Japanese and the more important basics and fundamentals of the language. Building a firm grasp of the basics helps to increase the degree of progress achieved when moving onto the intermediate and advanced classes.



Akamonkai places particular emphasis on beginner level education in our curriculum. This is because analyzing the tendencies of past students has shown that students who move on to the intermediate and advanced classes after building a firm foundation in the basics show a drastic improvement compared to students who move on to the higher levels with a less firm grasp of the basics. These students tend to either have trouble improving or, feeling their own limitations, to give up altogether. We have 7 beginner levels, however it is not required for all students to complete each of these levels. The beginner curriculum has 3 courses: A 2 stage course which proceeds at a relatively fast pace, moving onto the next level in 6 months (Beginner 1 -> Beginner 2), a 3 stage course which proceeds at a slower pace with repeated review, moving onto the next level after 9 months (Beginner A -> Beginner B -> Beginner C) and a 4 stage course for international students having difficulty mastering Japanese to a satisfying degree and international students who have difficulties with foreign languages in general, moving on to the next level

after 1 year (Introductory 1 -> Introductory 2 -> Beginner B -> Beginner C).

International students can consult with us on their course period based on their own goals, abilities, study styles, and home study time. However, a set degree of performance is required to switch from the 3 stage and 4 stage courses to the 2 stage course. By holding the courses during semesters, this detailed (leveled study) system allows students to restudy sections if a student finds that they are not able to keep up with a class or that they have difficulty understanding some items, even part way through a semester. This system combines students in each class according to their Japanese language skill levels which allows for focused study on weak areas, making for more efficient and effective learning.

Beginner 1

Students learn approximately 180 entry level kanji characters, beginner grammar and approximately 800 words allowing them to carry out the conversations and routine paperwork needed for daily life. In addition, students communicate through a {question} and {answer} format and learn to read simple and short sentences.

Beginner 2

Students learn approximately 350 basic kanji characters, basic grammar and approximately 1,500 words allowing them to carry out daily communication including expressing their own intentions, ideas and desires. This level allows students to understand basic Japanese customs. Students also learn to read simple and short sentences and write short sentences.

Beginner intermediate classes for learning slightly longer Japanese sentences and conversations and serving as a bridge from beginner to intermediate classes.

Beginner intermediate classes are aimed at improving the retention and application capabilities of the grammar items studied in the beginner classes, as well as increasing study on “reading comprehension”, which is not covered in detail in the beginner classes, to allow students to smoothly handle the longer sentences which appear more frequently in the intermediate classes.

Beginner Intermediate

Students learn to select and use appropriate sentence structures when speaking on a given topic. Students listen to conversations and monologues of specific longer lengths, learn to speak freely about the topics discussed and become accustomed to reading longer sentences. This level also fosters a viewpoint of understanding different cultures.



Intermediate classes aimed at acquiring Japanese Language Proficiency Test N1 and N2.

These classes develop “communication skills and speaking ability” focusing on cases of common scenes encountered during life in Japan and begin preparation for Japanese Language Proficiency Test N2.

Intermediate 1

Students systematically learn grammar while developing their abilities to reliably communicate in the various situations encountered during daily life in Japan. In addition, students will learn to be able to describe topics relevant to them or in which they have an interest. Study is not carried out in classrooms alone, but through direct contact with the real Japan in activities outside the classroom, cultivating a viewpoint that allows for understanding of new and different cultures. Students also begin preparation for Japanese Language Proficiency Test N2.

Intermediate 2

Through text study, students aim to master a good balance of the 4 skills necessary to be educated at institutions of higher learning in Japan. In addition, students will be exposed to as many items that will aid in developing in them the widest possible understanding of Japan's society and culture, cultivating a comprehensive set of skills and capabilities through a variety of activities including activities outside the classroom. This class completes the preparation for Japanese Language Proficiency Test N2 and transitions to preparation for Japanese Language Proficiency Test N1. Students will also begin preparation for the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students in this class.

Intermediate 3

Continuing on from Intermediate class 2, students will acquire a good balance of vocabulary, grammar, reading comprehension and listening comprehension in this class which focuses on the logic capabilities necessary to be educated at institutions of higher learning in Japan. This class also serves as a bridge to the advanced classes. In addition, students will also expand their knowledge on a variety of social themes and acquire the skills necessary to participate in discussions. At the same time the course also carries out preparation for Japanese Language Proficiency Test N1 and the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students, aiming to improve the overall level of students' command of Japanese.



Advanced level classes aimed at earning high scores on the Japanese Language Proficiency Test and the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students.

In the advanced classes, almost all students are capable of passing Japanese Language Proficiency Test N1. At the advanced level, instruction focuses on points for obtaining the highest possible scores on the Japanese Language Proficiency Test and Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students.

Advanced 1

Through text study, students develop reading comprehension levels which allow them to read newspapers and magazines, and develop the listening skills that will allow them to understand television news and other programs. In addition, students will also develop their abilities to express themselves logically through preparation for the Japanese Language Proficiency Test and Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students, and this class also aims to further strengthen students' retention of required vocabulary and functional words (Japanese Language Proficiency Test N1).

Advanced 2-4

These classes foster the reading comprehension abilities that will allow students to read newspapers and magazines as well as the listening skills that will allow students to understand the detailed content of television news programs and documentaries. In addition, students will learn to better use the vocabulary and functional words they have acquired through preparation for the Japanese Language Proficiency Test N1 and Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students to logically express their own opinions and views in discussions and short essays. These classes also foster a comprehensive Japanese language ability that students will be able to put to practical use in Japanese universities and other post-graduation activities through a variety of study



Special school entrance preparation classes which carry out training for tests and interviews aimed at enrolling in higher education institutions

These special classes provide students with reliable advice on study methods and establishing learning plans. Every year large numbers of Akamonkai students enter national universities, famous private universities and popular specialist schools.

Special School Entrance Preparation Classes

Special classes aimed at students wishing to enter national universities, famous private universities and graduate schools. These classes cover not only Japanese Language Proficiency Test N1 and Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students preparation, but also carry out practice interview exams and practice so that students can smoothly respond to questions frequently encountered in actual entrance interviews. These classes also provide advice on writing the study plans, research plans and statements of intent required when submitting applications.


Graduation trip

The Akamonkai Japanese Language School dormitories can house approximately 300 students. Each room features full facilities including internet access. The dormitories are located close to Nippori Station on the JR Yamanote line, easily accessible from both the main campus and the Nippori campus, a location that is extremely convenient for commuting to school and for other travel. In addition, school staff are always on duty at the student dormitories, so that students can receive the necessary care and support for illness, injuries and other situations even when first arriving in Japan and unable to effectively communicate in Japanese.


Nippori, where the Akamonkai Japanese Language School is located, is a very appealing area which features very modern scenery as a result of recent redevelopment. 
I'd rather live in the dorms, which have more space, since the rent is the same anyway. The dorms are also close to the station.

On my days off, I work part time teaching English to Japanese students. While I'm an English teacher, I also often learn some Japanese from my students.





I spend a lot of my days off at home. I spend my time doing laundry, cleaning and other household activities. Then I rent DVDs and enjoy watching movies.




